IMPLEMENTATION REGIONS

The fund is open to all ECOWAS member states. Countries are selected based on a predefined selection process. The FRSD focuses on the most fragile and remote regions where increased needs are often met by little development efforts.

THE GAMBIA (PILOT)

- completed in 2023
- almost 5000 young people reached
- 70% women



- currently reaching ~3000 young people
- > 50% women

FRSD EMPOWERS WITH GENDER TRANSFORMATIVE APPROACHES

- Especially women are encouraged to take on the responsibility of becoming facilitators to be positioned as breadwinners and decision makers.
- Aminata Baldé is one of the FRSD facilitators undergoing intensive trainings in sustainable farming, marketing, human rights, and women's rights.
- Her goal is to bring this knowledge back to her community and share it with fellow farmers.
- Despite being a busy mother, she attends the training as childcare is provided.
- She acts as the custodian of material and vocational support to the community. She has been entrusted with this responsibility by her community and her accountability is documented through the memorandum.









Gender transformative approaches in the electrification of rural areas:

- Women tend to be the primary energy users in a household but are rarely decision makers in energy purchasing.
- As primary providers of household care work, women are more likely to be responsible for energy-intensive chores.
- Traditional gender roles, therefore, result in different patterns of energy use between men and women.


→ women stand to gain disproportionately from electrification
