German municipalities are supporting their Ukrainian partner towns and cities in protecting the population and in their reconstruction efforts.

Challenge: municipalities are stretched to their limits

In February 2022, Russia began a large-scale invasion of Ukraine that has severed links to essential supply facilities for large parts of the country, especially the city centres. The war of aggression also triggered the largest movement of refugees within Europe since the Second World War. The United Nations estimates that around five million people – approximately 14 per cent of the total population – has fled from eastern to western Ukraine. The number of people wounded in the war and in need of both medical and psychological care is also growing.

The municipalities hosting the refugees are stretched to their limits – much of their basic infrastructure has been destroyed or damaged, or is now overwhelmed. People have insufficient access to municipal facilities and appropriate health care services, meaning that civil protection standards can no longer be maintained.

German-Ukrainian partnership: communities supporting each other

Our solution: harness the potential of German towns and cities

The project, Improving Civil Protection and Reconstruction in Municipal Partnerships with Ukraine, uses the potential of German municipalities to provide long-term support to Ukrainian towns, cities and municipalities. The project is funded by the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ) and is being implemented by GIZ. The cooperation partners are Engagement Global's Service Agency, Communities in One World, as well as the associations of German cities, of German counties, and of German towns and municipalities.

For civil protection and reconstruction in Ukraine, it is essential that relief supplies, such as care materials for rehabilitation and solar lighting, are delivered quickly and directly to the relevant towns, cities and municipalities. At the heart of our project is therefore a procurement campaign to supply Ukrainian municipalities with urgently needed materials and equipment. In a modular approach, the German municipalities can choose what equipment they deliver to Ukraine, in consultation with their partner municipalities. Ten different packages of materials and equipment – each worth EUR 60,000 – are available, for instance, to support youth, care patients or people with restricted mobility, or to supply renewable energy.

We procure the relief supplies and pass them on to the German municipalities. These in turn take care of the onward transportation to Ukraine and arrange for the local handover. We have adapted some of the procurement packages in the course of the project to address the changing needs of the municipalities and dynamic market conditions. Steps are taken to ensure the goods can be used sustainably after the end of the war.

A survey of the Ukrainian municipalities and a needs assessment by the United Nations were used to determine the contents of the procurement packages. The German–Ukrainian Partnership Conference in November 2023 and reports on experiences from the project were also key to identifying needs.

Our results: 110 municipalities deliver 900 tonnes of materials and equipment

- 110 German municipalities and their Ukrainian partner municipalities have participated in the project. The partnership between the Ukrainian and German municipalities is strengthened for the long term by their close cooperation, which will enable exchanges and mutual support even after the end of the war.
- 240 shipments of materials and equipment have brought over 900 tonnes of relief supplies to Ukrainian municipalities.
