Barrier Free Mobility

Unifying Efforts Towards Inclusive Transportation



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Equitable access to transportation is a fundamental right, yet 26.8 million individuals with disabilities in India face daily challenges due to inadequate infrastructure and public transport.

To address these issues, GIZ India hosted the "Barrier-Free Mobility: Unifying Efforts towards Inclusive Transportation" panel in May 2024.

The event focused on consolidating accessibility data and exploring the creation of a Universal Accessibility Alliance. Discussions emphasized the need for standardized data collection, leveraging technology, and fostering collaboration among government, private sector, and civil society to ensure inclusive urban mobility.

Key takeaways included the importance of universal design, digital literacy, and the active participation of Persons with Disabilities (PwDs) in policy-making to drive sustainable, disability-inclusive urban development in India.

Cities for Belonging

Deep Dive Sessions on Inclusive and Accessible Mobility

TUMI and ITDP held online deep dive sessions connecting transport practitioners, academia, policymakers and the disability advocacy community to help understand the gaps on how we can create cities that are inclusive and accessible for all.

The first session, held on July, focused on Building a Community of Peers to discuss the challenges and gaps on universal access, while the second session – which took place on the 21st August – focused on building ideas to learn best practices and approaches from one another. Each session had two timeslots to accommodate for global time zones, totaling to more than 100 participants around the world coming from academia, the development sector, the private and public sector, as wll as from organizations for persons with disabilities.

Insights from the sessions will be used as input in a visual policy brief and white paper on inclusive and accessible mobility to be released later this year.

Community-Led Solutions for Inclusive Mobility in Africa

Innovative Approaches from the Rethinking Transport Lab on Just Mobility



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From February 26 to March 1, 2024, GIZ hosted the second Rethinking Transport Lab on "Just Mobility in Urban and Rural Areas," bringing together 29 young professionals from 21 African countries. Collaboratively, they developed six forward-thinking solutions to advance equitable and sustainable transport.

Among the solutions from the Lab, the Safe Active Streets Program, aims to revitalize walking and cycling infrastructure in African cities—one street at a time—through community-led financing and shared ownership.

Another solution, the Langa Disability Movement, is a youth-driven organization advocating for robust frameworks that ensure disability inclusion in all sustainable mobility planning. This initiative addresses the lack of inclusive stakeholder engagement frameworks, aiming to strengthen disability-inclusive approaches in transport development.

All solutions aim to support the development of more inclusive transport systems. Following the Lab, the groups behind the ideas are looking for opportunities to further develop and implement their ideas.



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Designing Infrastructure to Empower People with Disabilities

A Powerful Speech from Crystal Asige



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At the TUMI2023 Conference, Kenyan Senator Crystal Asige delivered a powerful speech on the importance of designing inclusive infrastructure. A passionate advocate for disability rights and a trailblazing politician, Asige shared her journey with glaucoma and the challenges she faces as a visually impaired person.

She emphasized that true disability stems from barriers, not impairments, and called for infrastructure that empowers individuals rather than limits them.

Asige also highlighted the need for Universal Design, particularly in Africa, to ensure that infrastructure meets the needs of all people, including women with disabilities. She urged designers and policymakers to prioritize accessibility and climate resilience, fostering a future where everyone can live with dignity, freedom, and independence.

The Intersection of Gender, Disability, and Access



Mobility systems often overlook the experiences of disabled and neurodiverse individuals. Women Mobilize Women held a webinar, hosted by Melissa Bruntlett, featuring a thought-provoking discussion with Dr. Kay Inkle and Anna Zivarts, on how mobility can be more inclusive.

The speakers shared personal and professional insights, highlighting the unique challenges faced by disabled people in accessing walking, cycling, and public transport. Dr. Inkle, a leader in mobility justice for disabled cyclists, and Zivarts, an advocate for disability rights and a non-driver, emphasized the importance of designing mobility systems that consider all users.

This conversation shed light on the critical need for equitable access to mobility as a cornerstone of participation in society.

Juntas nos Movemos

TranSIT Gathers Experts to Tackle Mobility Challenges in Oaxaca

GIZ México, through the bilateral project, TranSIT, in collaboration with the Ministry of Transport and Mobility of Oaxaca, hosted the "Juntas nos Movemos" conference at the Cultural and Convention Center in Oaxaca.

This event aimed to enhance public transport inclusivity for women, vulnerable groups, and people with disabilities. With over 100 participants, including national authorities, state and municipal representatives, civil society organizations, and international delegates from Colombia and Peru, the conference sparked discussions on inclusive mobility actions.

Topics such as the role of women in public transport, sexual harassment protocols, gender and inclusion measures, road safety, and public transport formalisation were thoroughly explored. The workshops highlighted the importance of these issues and reinforced the commitment to safe and, inclusivce mobility policies that could serve as a model for other regions.
